The program, which was officially launched in Kununurra recently, provides targeted support for MG families to foster improved school attendance and education outcomes.

Garry Gerrard and Roseanne
Chulung have been employed as
outreach workers with the
program and liaise with other
service providers to implement
family plans which can improve
school attendance.

"Families are often faced with issues that can prevent their kids from getting to school and our job is to work out ways these issues can be overcome," Ms Chulung said.



"It might be as simple as just getting transport to school or access to uniforms and books and they're all problems that can be easily resolved."

Ms Chulung said she had already been impressed to see MG families keen to get involved in the program and improve their children's school attendance.

"We're already working with nine families so that means we're working with 28 MG kids to help get them to school more often," she said.

"It's important that MG Corporation works closely with KAI to negotiate employment and business outcomes which will provide long-term social and economic benefits to local traditional owners," she said.




Directors and staff of MG
